MAJOR INFORMATION

- Students enrolled in the Bachelor of Arts program are required to complete all coursework in the respective majors with a minimum grade of C. Course grades of D and F are not counted toward graduation requirements and must be replaced with a grade of C or better before graduation or before using that course as a prerequisite for another required course.
- Forty (40) credit hours must be earned in courses numbered 300-499.
- No courses in the college and major requirements for graduation in the College of Arts and Media may be taken Credit/Non-Credit unless the course is otherwise specified.
- Students pursuing the B.A. will complete a capstone project appropriate to their emphasis area and outside field. Projects must be approved by the student's school director and capstone advisor. B.A. students must register for ART 499, Senior Capstone Project.
- Visual Art and Design Track Core: 25 credit hours: ART 101, 201, 202, 214, 215, 217, 218, 219, 299, 499
- Studio Electives: 12 credit hours selected from the following: ART 301, 303, 305, 307, 312, 314, 315, 317, 318, 343, 353, 418, 444. Students must choose four courses that reflect the student's program of study selected in consultation with the academic advisor in Art and Design. The purpose of this component is to allow the student to engage with various media beyond exposure in the art core and to develop further studio skills.
- Additional studio art courses: Working in consultation with the Academic Advisor in Art and Design, students select 12-15 hours of 300 and 400 level art studio courses intended to allow the student to develop concepts and skills that enhance the student's ability to pursue career goals in an interdisciplinary way.
- Minor 15-18 credit hours: Students may elect to pursue a second major with their non-art electives rather than a minor
- Additional Non-Art Electives 17-29 credit hours

- Have met all major(s) and college requirements;
- Have met the requirements of the Core Curriculum;
- · Have met the residence requirements of Marshall University, including 12 hours of 300/400 level coursework in the student's college (see section entitled "Residence Requirements" in the undergraduate catalogue);
- Be enrolled at Marshall at least one semester of the senior year;
- · Have transferred no more than 72 credit hours from an accredited West Virginia twoyear institution of higher education.

Colleges and specific programs may have unique requirements that are more stringent than those noted above. Students are responsible for staying informed about and ensuring that they meet the requirements for graduation.

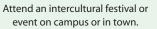
