MAJOR INFORMATION

- The total number of free electives will depend on the amount of double and triple counting of requirements.
- See course attributes each semester for courses that meet multiple requirements.
- Questions about requirements should be directed to the College of Liberal Arts (304-696-2350). Core II and COLA requirements may not be double counted.
- Forty-eight credit hours (sixteen 3-hour courses) must be at the 300/400 level.
- Students must earn a C or better in ENG 201 and all foreign language courses.
- Minimum of 120 hours to graduate.
- A major in one of the modern foreign languages consists of ten courses, typically thirty semester hours, in the same language. Courses taken at Marshall are three credit hours each. Courses that transfer from study abroad may transfer as four credit hours, but each of these courses is to be considered equivalent to one three-hour Marshall course. Courses numbered 101 do not count toward the major.

Milestone Course: This is a key success marker for your major. See your advisor to discuss the importance of this course in your plan of study.

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The study of foreign languages emphasizes the development of critical thinking skills—increased powers of observation, analysis, logical reasoning, memory, and adaptability—that are immediately transferable to other areas of higher education and to a diversity of careers. In learning to understand, speak, read, and write a foreign language a student acquires direct access to another view of the world at a time when intercultural understanding, at both the national and international levels, has become an urgent priority.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- Have a minimum of 120 credit hours (some colleges or majors require more);
- Have an overall and Marshall Grade Point Average of 2.00 or higher;
- Have an overall Grade Point Average of 2.00 or higher in the major area of study;
- Have earned a grade of C or better in English 201 or 201 H;
- Have met all major(s) and college requirements;
- Have met the requirements of the Core Curriculum;
- Have met the residence requirements of Marshall University, including 12 hours of 300/400 level coursework in the student's college (see section entitled "Residence Requirements" in the undergraduate catalogue);
- Be enrolled at Marshall at least one semester of the senior year;
- Have transferred no more than 72 credit hours from an accredited West Virginia two-year institution of higher education.

Colleges and specific programs may have unique requirements that are more stringent than those noted above. Students are responsible for staying informed about and ensuring that they meet the requirements for graduation.

Due to the complexities of degree programs, it is unfortunate but inevitable that an error may occur in the creation of this document. YEAR ONE

Stay on the Herd Path and come to class! Class attendance is more important to your success than your high school GPA, your class standing, or your ACT/SAT scores.



In order to graduate on time, you need to take an average of 15 credits per semester. Are you on track? Take 15 to Finish.



Develop relationships with professors who can serve as future references by attending their office hours.



Attend an intercultural festival or event on campus or in town.



Declare a major before your 30th hour. Participate in a Career Exploration Experience (job shadow) to help decide on your major and career goals.



Join French Club and participate in cultural and language activities.

YEAR THREE



Apply to be a New Student Orientation Leader or a Campus Tour Guide.



Join the Marshall Mentor Network and connect with professionals in your field to discuss your major, career path, and more.



Are you on track to graduate? Meet with your advisor for your Junior Eval to make sure you know what requirements you have left.



No need to wait until graduate school. Discuss undergraduate research opportunities with faculty in your major right now.



Networking is key! Attend a Career Expo to seek employment opportunities and network with employers in your field.



Volunteer in local schools and libraries to share the target language and culture.



National Student Exchange: Study away for one semester and gain a different perspective. Choose from institutions across the US, US territories, or Canada.

YEAR TWO



Are you completing enough credits to graduate on time? Dropping or failing a class can put you behind. Use summer terms to quickly get back on track.



Your degree requires a minor. Think about how to enhance your major with a minor that gives you a related skill set.



Think about who can help you grow as a student and a professional (professors, advisors, alumni, etc) and ask at least one to be your mentor.



Explore peer leadership opportunities through the FAM program, or apply to be a UNI Peer Mentor.



Talk to faculty about pursuing optional professional certifications.



College is a great time to experience the world! Consider studying abroad in the summer, during Spring Break, or for an entire semester.



Meet with a career education specialist to conduct a "gap analysis." Figure out the skills you'll need for the career you want while you still have time to build them.

YEAR FOUR



This is it! Are you on track to graduate? Meet with your advisor for your Senior Eval to see what requirements you have left.



Prepare to present your capstone project at the COLA Undergraduate Research and Creativity Conference in April.



Check with your advisor to see if you qualify to graduate with honors.



Want to continue your education and increase your opportunities? Talk to a faculty member about whether graduate school fits your career goals.



Did you do really well in a hard course? Become a Tutor or a Supplemental Instructor.



Take an elective course that links diversity to your field of study.



Be at the top of your professional game! Prepare a final resume and practice your interview skills with a career coach in Career Education.
