**Dr. Kelli Johnson: Preserving
History in Fairfield**

Associate Professor and Librarian Dr. Kelli Johnson has received a grant from West Virginia Humanities Council for her African Americans in WV Oral Histories Project, which is focusing on collecting and preserving history from the Fairfield neighborhood in Huntington, West Virginia.

Fairfield is a historically African American neighborhood, and when a pictorial project had been donated to Marshall's Special Collections, Dr. Johnson felt the need to find the context behind the photos and began to interview elders to discover a more in-depth depiction of 1940s Fairfield.

Dr. Johnson feels a sense of urgency

to collect and preserve these stories, especially since the elders of the community were alive and able to experience the city during the Civil Rights Movement. These types of first-hand accounts are invaluable but are often lost once the generation has passed away, which is why Dr. Johnson and the students assisting in the project have been working to expand the narratives within the project.

The oral history project is being housed in Marshall Libraries' Special Collections. Transcripts of the interviews are available on the African American History LibGuide, under the 'Huntington, WV' tab (<https://libguides.marshall.edu/AAH>). They are currently working on making the audio files available as well.

Additionally, Dr. Johnson has expressed interest in collaborating with Professor Trowbridge on working to include these oral histories on the Clio app for related Huntington enteries. Not only would those participating in Huntington walking tours via the app be able to see pictures of the city in the past, but they would also be able to listen to stories of how the city used to be and the historical importance of businesses and centers long forgotten.
