

Robert Maslowski, current President of Council for West Virginia Archaeology, Graduate Instructor at the Marshall University Graduate College, and retired Archeologist for the Huntington District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, possesses extensive knowledge of West Virginia archeology, culture, and history. He has taught a wide range of courses on archaeology, Appalachian and West

His numerous publications have appeared in venues such as *World Archaeology, National Geographic Society Research Reports, Pennsylvania Archaeologist, Wonderful West Virginia*, and *West Virginia Archaeologist* (which he also serves as Editor).
