MAJOR INFORMATION

- The total number of free electives required depends on the number of hours completed in STA (150 or 150B) and ENG (101 or 101P) and the number of hours that can be double-counted toward multiple degree requirements.
- Students must earn a grade of "C" or better in all ACC 100-, 200-, and 300-level required courses.
- Students who plan to sit for the CPA exam in West Virginia need 30 credits of accounting courses at the 300-level or higher. This requirement can be satisfied by pursuing the Master of Science in Accountancy degree or using six of the free elective credits to take additional accounting credits. For the six free elective hours, students are encouraged to choose from undergraduate courses at the 300- or 400-level (except ACC 310 and ACC 490) that are not a required course or ACC 512, ACC 514, ACC 544, or ACC

- 548 for graduate credit through the 3+2 Program.
- ACC 499 is the capstone course for all Accounting majors. It can only be taken during the senior year after all prerequisites are met.
- The International Business Elective can be met by taking one of the following courses: ECN 408, 420, 421, 460, FIN 440, MGT 445, or MKT 371.
- The Communication Studies Elective can be met by taking one of the following courses: CMM 302, 308, 315, 319, or 322.
- Multicultural or International additional university requirement met with International Business Elective.
- Please check with advisor about course offerings. Not all classes will be offered every semester.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- Have a minimum of 120 credit hours (some colleges or majors require more);
- Have an overall and Marshall Grade Point Average of 2.00 or higher;
- Have an overall Grade Point Average of 2.00 or higher in the major area of study;
- Have earned a grade of C or better in English 201 or 201 H;
- Have met all major(s) and college requirements;
- Have met the requirements of the Core Curriculum;
- Have met the residence requirements of Marshall University, including 12 hours of 300/400 level coursework in the student's college (see section entitled "Residence Requirements" in the undergraduate catalogue);
- Be enrolled at Marshall at least one semester of the senior year;
- Have transferred no more than 72 credit hours from an accredited West Virginia two-year institution of higher education.

Colleges and specific programs may have unique requirements that are more stringent than those noted above. Students are responsible for staying informed about and ensuring that they meet the requirements for graduation.
