- Minimum of 120 hours to graduate.
- ENG 355 and 499 are not offered in summer.
- English majors will fulfill the university's requirements for WI classes by taking the ENG classes required for the major.
- ENG 350 must be taken within the first 9 hours of coursework within the major. ENG 499 cannot be taken until 12 hours of ENG coursework at the 400-level has been completed with a grade of C or better.
- No more than six hours of ENG courses at the 200-level may count toward the BA degree in English.

- Have met the residence requirements of Marshall University, including 12 hours of 300/400 level coursework in the student's college (see section entitled "Residence Requirements" in the undergraduate catalogue);
- Be enrolled at Marshall at least one semester of the senior year;
- Have transferred no more than 72 credit hours from an accredited West Virginia twoyear institution of higher education.

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
